

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140 YEARS OF BRINGING HOPE ON THE STREETS

Throughout 2022 we will be celebrating 140 years of Church Army bringing hope to the streets. Since 1882 we have been pioneering new ministries, seeking to draw alongside the broken and reaching out to some of the most unreachable people and places in the UK and Ireland. Church Army's story is one of a large, widespread movement to transform lives through the gospel, and at the same time it is a story of God moving in people's lives, calling them to unexpected ministries in ways they had never imagined. Each of them were inspired by Wilson Carlile's vision to put the gospel call of evangelism into the hands of ordinary Christian women and men so that everyone everywhere would have the opportunity to hear about Jesus.



I was at the service on Remembrance Sunday listening to someone from Church Army talk about sacrifice. That was the first time I had realised what the Lord Jesus had done for me. I let go of all the past and all my sin, and the most wonderful sense of peace filled me.

Cycling home I stopped halfway and I began to pray "Lord I would love to share this wonderful peace with other people"

Sister Rosalie Jacobs (d. 2013) Commissioned 1940 Wilson Carlile was somebody who was always looking forward. He wasn't someone who let things stay in a particular place just because it had always been that way. He was looking for change and progression. He didn't want to do things that other people were doing, he wanted to push all the boundaries forward.

Sister Joan Hudspeth (1925-2017) Commissioned 1952

LAUNCHING LEAD



Church Army is launching LEAD, a suite of resources for growing leaders whatever shape or form that leadership takes. We talked to Jayne Elliott, Church Army's Leadership Development Officer, about what LEAD is and how it came about...

For more than 25 years I've been working with missional communities, and evangelism with marginalised and disadvantaged groups in Sheffield and the Midlands, where I'm originally from. I've worked in the statutory, public, and not-for-profit sectors, in both youth and adult homelessness and have also trained in pastoral supervision and reflective practice. During that time, I learnt a lot of things that would have been helpful to have known when I first started.

I began to ask myself "What are the most important things that I wish my 25-year-old self had known about leadership?". I started writing a list that became the outline for the LEAD learning resources.

LEAD needed to answer the question: What could help busy evangelists and pioneers to make time to do some reflective learning? And that's when we had the idea about action

learning coaching communities where leaders could meet online together, creating flexible content so that they could choose the topic they wanted to explore by; doing an action, reflecting on a passage of scripture, examining a case study or digging deeper into blogs, videos or other reading material.

LEAD is all about reflecting with others and agreeing to take action. Each leader's learning experience is shaped by connecting with other leaders. Action learning goes hand-in-hand with weekly learning material which offers every person a range of content to choose from so they can apply what they are learning to real life situations.

We know the role that good leadership plays in helping others to develop the confidence to lead.



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WHAT IS LEAD?

LEAD is a suite of learning resources specifically designed for busy leaders to grow and develop on their leadership journey.

This is done online using high quality, practical content, using action learning and has been developed in collaboration with a range of leaders across Church Army's Mission Community.

HOW DOES LEAD WORK?

The LEAD programme is designed around four leadership dimensions: Attitude, Skills, Knowledge and Experience, with modules to choose from in each of these areas.

LEAD is online but also done in community with your action learning peers.

WHO IS LEAD FOR?

LEAD is for anyone in any position of leadership. This could be a full-time ministry role, a small group or anything in-between. LEAD is designed with flexible content with relevance to a wide range of leaders.

WHAT OTHERS SAY?

LEAD has already been piloted by some of our Church Army evangelists, many of whom are busy and don't find traditional methods of learning very easy. Here is what they said...

"What has been most helpful for me has been the range of possible tasks to prepare for the next time we meet, I have used the Scripture references each time to explore Jesus' model of leadership" "I left LEAD with an increased awareness of my own skills, ability and calling and that has enabled me to be more assertive even in the last month since LEAD finished."

OUR EVANGELISTS IN TRAINING

Meet Heather Waller

Each year more people are called by God to the vocation of evangelism and begin their training to become Commissioned Church Army Evangelists while continuing to live and work in their own contexts. We caught up with Heather Waller, one of this year's Evangelists-in-Training, to hear about her calling to train and to tell people in Sheffield about Jesus.



I was born in Sheffield. My parents are from Belfast but moved here shortly before I was born. I moved to Liverpool for university and stayed there for 13 years before moving back to Sheffield.

A friend of mine is a Church Army Evangelist and when I moved back to Sheffield from Liverpool, where I'd been involved in a lot of outreach work, I got involved with what he was doing locally. I ended up joining his Messy Church team and talking with him about all the volunteering I was doing in my children's school. For years he was telling me I should get in touch with them. Then when lockdown hit and the school closed. I had a bit of time (not much as I was then home-schooling my three children) to think ahead about my next steps. I looked at the Church Army website and discovered that I have the same vision and values and heartbeat to see lives transformed by knowing Jesus and soon began the discernment process. And now the rest is history!

"WHEN I DO GET INTO CONVERSATION ABOUT JESUS, I LOVE HOW PEOPLE'S EYES LIGHT UP AS THEY DISCOVER WHO HE IS RATHER THAN WHO THEY THOUGHT HE WAS" I'm not one to launch in at the deep end with talking about Jesus but I am transparent about my faith with everyone I talk to. I hope people see Him in me whether I'm explicitly talking about Him or not. When I do get into conversation about Jesus, I love how people's eyes light up as they discover who He is rather than who they thought He was; when they find out how kind He is, the miracles He performed, and how He loves them so much that He died for them even though they didn't know Him or even like Him. I love to see people realise how He accepts them just as they are, and they don't need to do anything to earn His approval.

I love connecting with people, having a lot of fun and food and having spiritual conversations. I love being authentic and unashamed of loving Jesus and I love finding out about other people's spiritual journeys too. I studied world religions at university as I've always been interested in different world views. My context is very multicultural so there are lots of opportunities for these kind of two-way conversations in my various roles at school.

For a number of years I have had a burning desire to set up a Messy Church that is a highly accessible expression of church for people who find conventional church either unappealing or inaccessible for whatever reason. As a single parent of three extremely lively boys, I have a particular heart to remove barriers to church for people who have struggled to feel accepted or who don't fit into conventional models of church, or feel unable to conform. A few years ago. I decided to trial a Messy Church in my house. To my surprise, of all the people I invited, it was school parents who came. Some travelled across the city without their children, or even a car, even though it was a Saturday daytime! I had expected it to be neighbours who would come but none of them did. When the Bishop of Sheffield set up an initiative to have 25 Messy Church congregations in schools by 2025. I was up for it. Then, when the diocese approached the school. I was more than ready to be a willing lead! Taking on the role of running a Messy Church for school families is literally a dream come true. It is now every month after school in the hall. The head teacher loves it. We have huge amounts of meaningful fun and relationshipbuilding. It was stalled by lockdown, along with a lot of other things, but we got creative with it all using Zoom, Facebook lives and other online platforms, and that has helped us hit the ground running as we've come back. The families who come represent the diversity of the school and

for continued open doors and favour at school, for salvations, and for spiritual protection for me and my children.

we always have a waiting list. People don't want to leave at the end. I'm excited to see how it will develop and I'm planning to do something like Alpha next term.

Training to be a Church Army Evangelist is exactly what I have been looking for. I feel like everything I've done in my life up until now has culminated in being part of Church Army, even though I didn't know it until recently!

I'm so excited by the topics we study. They're helping me to dig deeper into the Word so my ministry can be more strongly underpinned by knowledge and understanding as well as my heart and gut. I found the recent training on the wealth of the cross extremely useful as it gave me time and space to really wrestle with the theology of what I deliver on the ground.

FRONTLINE MINISTRY

Meet George Newell



Across the UK and Ireland Church Army evangelists are seeking to tell people about Jesus in the places God has called them to. We caught up with George Newell, one of Church Army's evangelists in Northern Ireland, to tell us about his work for the gospel...

Llive in Belfast and am married to Funice and have two children. Simon and Sarah and two lovely wee granddaughters Orla and Charvs. I have not always lived in Belfast where I now am based. I originally come from the fishing village of Kilkeel and at the age of 30, at a mission run by the local Church of Ireland. I made a personal commitment to Jesus Christ. My life was totally changed and transformed, a total lifestyle turnaround and over the next number of vears I sensed the Lord calling me into full-time Christian ministry. This meant selling up my Painting and Decorating business and in August 1997 we as a family left Kilkeel and headed to Sheffield where I started training at the Wilson Carlile College of Evangelism (now the Wilson Carlile Centre). From coming to faith in Christ the Lord has laid on my heart those who don't vet know Him, and Church Army was the vehicle to both train and equip me for that ministry and in the early days coming out of college He provided employment enabling me to do it.

After spending nearly five years as Parish Evangelist and Church Planter in Carrigrohane Union of Parishes in Cork and 11 years as Outreach Co-ordinator for Willowfield Parish Community Association in East Belfast, I now work for New Wine Ireland as their Mission

and Leadership Co-ordinator (while fulfilling a part-time evangelist role with Willowfield Parish Church). My job involves encouraging and training churches in evangelism, leading missions and working with church leaders. I also facilitate an evangelist training course where we have trained over 40 lay evangelists. It is such a blessing to see others released into ministry and a privilege to be part of that.

Through my job I have had the opportunity to share the Good News of the gospel across this island of Ireland and have had the privilege of seeing many people come to faith in Christ. I continue to be amazed how the Kingdom of God impacts lives through the preaching of His Word, that quiet conversation on the street, His healing touch as you pray for the sick, that prophetic word that changes a heart, the infilling of the Holy Spirit that transforms a life – totally amazing. Yet should I be amazed? Is it not what the Lord promised He would do through us - His church?

Covid 19 has restricted much of my work over the last two years, but things are changing, and I have several missions planned for later in the year and I look forward with excitement and expectation of what the Lord is going to do, knowing that by His Holy Spirit He is already speaking into people's lives. Jesus tells us 'Wake up and look around. The fields are already ripe for harvest' and that is so true. My expectation is to see God's Kingdom at work around me, where people come to a personal faith in Christ and I have found that to be the case, not because of who I am, rather because of who God is and His heart of compassion and grace for a broken and lost world.

YOUR GIFT MATTERS

I've had the great joy in the last few weeks of being involved in an initiative called 'Passion for Life'. Our church, along with over 750 other churches across the UK and Ireland, have been stepping up our mission and evangelism. We've been praying, learning and reaching out together to make Jesus known in our communities.

That month of focus came to an end just recently, but as Christians, mission and evangelism is for the whole of our life. The Bible is clear, with Jesus himself calling us to go and make disciples. Early on in His earthly ministry Jesus urges His followers with these words: Then He said to His disciples,

"THE HARVEST IS PLENTIFUL BUT THE WORKERS ARE FEW. ASK THE LORD OF THE HARVEST, THEREFORE, TO SEND OUT WORKERS INTO HIS HARVEST FIELD."

(Matthew 9:37-38)

As I've travelled around this region, I've had the great privilege of meeting some of those 'workers' - men and women in Church Army's centres of mission, those in our projects, and individuals on the ground whose daily focus is to share the love of the Lord Jesus in their communities. I'm hearing stories of lives being impacted by the gospel because those workers have been resourced and equipped for the harvest field.

Recently I had the opportunity to talk with Alan*, formerly in prison for violent crime, now a resident in a medium security hospital. Alan is allowed out up to three hours each week; tagged and escorted by a member of the unit's team.

Alan has been going to a centre of mission pop up café locally every week for four months. When I asked him why, he said,

"I LIKE THE PEOPLE I MEET; I DON'T FEEL JUDGED. I FEEL LOVED AND ENJOY CONVERSATIONS WITH NORMAL PEOPLE". Alan gets a small weekly allowance and out of it loves to donate to the café. Just recently he has started attending church on Sundays. He wouldn't yet call himself a Christian, but he speaks of God 'looking after him' and says he prays for help in his situation.

Your gifts enable our workers to reach people like Alan and to equip and resource new workers. So, thank you for standing with us, do please pray that support would grow and that by God's grace we would be able to extend further into His harvest field with the Good News of Jesus.

REMAIN IN ME

'I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing.'

JOHN 15:5

It will soon be time to Admit and Commission some of our evangelists who've completed their evangelism training. Leading up to this, they will all be encouraged to think about how they are going to continue to develop their ministries over the coming years. As I reflect on the last 30 years of my own leadership development, I recognise how important these verses that Jesus speaks to the disciples in John 15 are for us as busy leaders in ministry.

We thrive in our leadership when we recognise not just who we are but 'whose' we are. Someone once told me "If you're too busy with ministry to pray on a daily basis then you're too busy." It's always stayed with me, even if I've not always been good at doing it. Fruitfulness in ministry comes out of a life that is rooted and grounded in Christ and surrendered to Him.

There are different seasons of ministry. Just as plants need to be well established before they will survive being uprooted and moved, so our fruitfulness comes as we learn to 'remain', rooted in Christ even when things don't always turn out the way we hoped.

Leadership formation and character development take time and we need to learn how to sustain our passion for ministry throughout the different seasons of ministry. Over the years I've had to learn the hard way that I cannot afford to become isolated in ministry. I need relationships with people who know me and to whom I choose to be accountable. I need to care for my wellbeing, giving time not just to the spiritual but the emotional, physical and mental too.

Jesus spent lots of time during his public ministry, walking, talking, eating, praying and encouraging His disciples to take time away from the demanding crowds. It's easy to feel guilty taking time off when ministering to people in need but the day I believe myself indispensable is the day I begin to become disconnected from the Vine.

Which season are you in right now? Can you see signs of God doing something new? Are you enjoying the fruit of persevering through the winter?

If you feel like you're in the autumn and God's pruning your life, or maybe you're in the barrenness of winter, may I encourage you to hang on, stay close to God and trust that there will be fruit both in your character and in your ministry. Spring will come.
