GETTING TO KNOW YOUR NEW CHURCH ARMY MAGAZINE





BRINGING HOPE TO THE STREETS IN 2023

2022 has certainly been a year like no other. We have seen turmoil throughout the government with three different Prime Ministers and numerous cabinet ministers. OUR EVANGELISTS

Meet Jenny

I have always been an evangelist because I just can't stop talking about Jesus!

Imagine being called by God to share the love and light of His Son, Jesus Christ with the world, as your vocation! That is the calling gifted evangelists feel when they decide to train to become a Church Army Evangelist. They are passionate people with a gift for sharing Good News and showing, through actions, that hope can shine even in the most desperate situations. But the life of a Church Army Evangelist looks different for everyone. Each person has their own unique calling to a different context, whether that is working with one of our Centres of Mission, talking with prisoners as a prison chaplain, or even fostering young children.

Jenny Falcón-Otero is an Evangelist at our Gwent Valleys Centre of Mission which is a partnership with the Diocese of Monmouth, situated in an ex-mining area of the Welsh valleys where she felt called to relocate to shortly after she was Commissioned and now lives and fosters with her husband. This is just part of her story...

have always been an evangelist because I just can't stop talking about Jesus! It is always encouraging to see people take the next step in their faith journey. Being a CA Evangelist enables me to go out with the blessing and backing of Church Army which helps me feel more empowered to reach even more people.

I live with my husband and our foster daughter. Until we moved to join

Gwent Valleys Centre of Mission, we chose to live in community with my parents. Throughout

lockdown we had others living with us at various points, including my sister and her partner, two friends from Spain, a young person with learning difficulties who joined us through the Shared Lives Scheme, and two foster children on different occasions. Our family has always been a bit like that, we usually have someone either living with us or about to move in.



I knew for a long time that fostering was a calling God placed on my life. We began with respite fostering but when COVID struck, an urgent need for new carers quickly developed and we found ourselves on the fast-track to being foster parents. We received a referral for a little boy for six weeks. We decided this would be manageable, but it wasn't until eight months later that he moved on from us.

During this time we've seen God working and transforming the lives of the three children we have now fostered, each in a different way but each equally as impactful. God has been with us through the ups and downs we've faced with each child and our hope and prayer is that any seeds of His love we have sown into these precious children will go with them into whatever they face next in their

PRAYER

CA IN ATTERCLIFFE & DARNALL

Attercliffe and Darnall are two areas in Sheffield, England. The former is an industrial area while the latter is a more residential area. Both areas have a history of being deprived and isolated. In recent years, there has been an increase in poverty and social needs in both areas. With a diverse population of around 10,000, unemployment is unusually high, and there are few opportunities for young people. Crime rates are also relatively high and 1 in 3 children in both areas are living in households with an income below the poverty line.

In 2020, during the first waves of COVID-19 and the lockdowns in England, husband and wife team Gina and Kinder Kalsi took on the tremendous challenge of leading the newly planted Attercliffe & Darnall Centre of Mission and during those years planted deep roots for hope and change among the local communities.

TOGETHER ON MISSION

Meet Kinder

orking together felt like a clear calling from God for us but where that would be and in what capacity wasn't quite so clear. After praying and listening to God and several signs, it became clear that we were meant to take up the challenge of beginning to grow a Centre of Mission in Attercliffe and Darnall, creating an impact on the local community. The area is an industrial suburb in the northeast area of Sheffield and has a diverse range of people from all kinds of faith backgrounds and nationalities. We felt like we had come home.

But the transition into our new roles would be more challenging than we ever expected as just two weeks after starting

COVID hit. Furlough felt inevitable and that our work in the community would be put on hold indefinitely since it seemed almost impossible to make new connections with people under the restrictions. However, with the daring and trusting support of Church Army, it seemed God had other ideas and used the pandemic as an opportunity to open doors, quite literally! Instead of shutting everything down, we decided to have faith that, guided by God, no matter what the situation, we could make a positive impact.

I received an unexpected phone call from Roses Bakers who had a surplus of food at the end of each day, to ask if I'd be interested in taking it? Having no links in the community we decided to take a brave step and knock on doors to offer the food. It was a step lead by faith, not knowing how it would be received in the local community. Some people said no but soon people began to trust us, and 18 months later we have a thriving network of people who can contact us about food.

Meet Gina

ne of the important things to recognise in this initiative is that it wasn't so much about the food itself but more about the contact it created with people. The sharing of the bread lead to conversations on doorsteps, relationships beginning between Kinder, me and the community. In the face of such adversity we had created a doorstep ministry.

Since the lockdown restrictions were lifted and people began meeting together in person, the ministry has grown into a firm foundation throughout the community, where trusting relationships have formed. A network of connections has developed through the sharing of food with one lady sharing the food with her entire street. Another lady delivers to lots of neighbours close by and it has opened up a real sense of togetherness. It is not a donation initiative but a sharing one where everyone is equal, it is a blessing to be shared and encourages others to adopt a sharing attitude. We are now known locally as the 'bread people' and it allows us to engage more easily within the local community, people are open to talk about our ministry and mission to create a new Christian community. People understand that we are sharing to show that each person is loved by God and we wish for everyone to feel the love of Christ. Kinder often tells people that the bread ie. PRAVER he gives them will only last a day, but the bread Jesus provides is for a lifetime.

- Pray for plans to develop a regular after school club.
- Pray for people to join us in the monastic rhythm of rest. prayer, play, hospitality and worship.
- Pray for more people to discover the love of Jesus for themselves and for Him to make a difference in their lives.
- Pray for a deepening sense of a community in Attercliffe and Darnall.
- Pray for local churches to be empowered and encouraged to share the love of Jesus locally.

CA'S PRISON CHAPLAINS

Just like He didn't forget about me, He won't forget about them.

Prisoners can often be seen in one light; people who have made mistakes, now paying for their crimes. We often forget that they are people like us, with hopes, dreams, and fears. Many have families who love and miss them, and they will one day return to society. One of the ways that helps prisoners through their time in prison and to prepare them for a positive and fulfilling life outside is prison chaplaincy. It is a vital service that provides much-needed support to both prisoners and prison staff. It has been shown to reduce reoffending rates and improve prisoner health and wellbeing. For many prisoners, the relationship they develop with their chaplain is one of the most positive relationships they will have while in prison.

Prison work has long been part of Church Army's work and we have CA Evangelists who serve as chaplains in some of the UK's prisons. Gill Martin is one of those Evangelists and is a chaplain at HMP Eastwood Park, a closed category prison in South Gloucestershire.

Meet Gill

have been at this prison for almost three years now but before this I really thought God had forgotten about me and prison chaplaincy. When I was training, I did a placement at Holloway Prison and I loved it. When I began trying to pursue this calling I couldn't find the right thing. I wondered if I had got it wrong about being a prison chaplain, maybe God had a different calling for me. But

later, when the role of being a prison chaplain came out of the blue, I knew I was being led by God and He hadn't forgotten me after-all.

'Do you have someone in the community who loves you?' is one of the first questions I will ask a new prisoner at the start of their sentence. It's a way of asking "do you have any friends or family who will visit you?", but without using the words friends, or family. These words can hold vastly different meanings for different prisoners, sometimes bringing up painful thoughts



or memories, so I try to avoid them. Their answer though, is vitally important. It lets me assess their need for support, but it also tells me a lot about the person behind the prison sentence. Sadly, some prisoners can't name anyone who loves them or would visit them.

Whilst prisons are full of people, they are often lonely places and those feelings of loneliness become magnified when a prisoner doesn't have anyone to visit them. As prison chaplains that is one of the things we can help with as there is a volunteer visitor scheme.

We answer requests for spiritual support; this can be anything from lighting candles for anniversaries and birthdays, to providing prayer for difficult situations or pastoral support for prisoners with ill relatives or suffering a bereavement. COVID was a difficult time, visitations, group meetings and fellowship stopped. To keep contact with the prisoners we wrote weekly reflections for each person and delivered them to their cells. During this time we reached people who wouldn't normally visit the chapel but looked forward to receiving their reflection and seeing a friendly face at their door.

It's a very privileged position to be in. Some of the prisoners have suffered abuse and are really broken and for some, the offence that sent them to prison was the last straw. Our constant message is that we can't change what happened, but we can walk with them, and support them through the next steps. Every day I am reminded that it could be any one of us in that prison and I feel blessed to be able to share with these prisoners that God loves us and loves each of us equally. There is nothing we can do to spoil his plan because he is more powerful than us. I have seen and felt God work in my life and I am not the only person whose life He can work in. I want to share that message with others who feel they are beyond God's love because no one is. Just like he didn't forget about me, He won't forget about them.

LENT RESOURCE 2023

Everything you need for Lent 2023

With just under four weeks until Lent begins we want to tell you about the CA Lent Resource for 2023.

The Church Army Lent Resource has been designed to give you, your small group or your church, space and time each day throughout Lent to listen to God, reflect on the Bible and see how and where you can listen to His leading in your actions and attitudes. Each pack contains 40 beautifully designed cards divided into Action Cards, Character Cards, Reflection Cards and Marks of Mission Cards.

ACTION CARDS

These cards include a relevant passage from Scripture, and a question for you to reflect on over the next few days to challenge yourself in your faith life. They focus on stories of faith in action from Church Army's Centres of Mission near where you are

CHARACTER CARDS

These cards focus on the faith story of people from the Bible, themes in their story, and signpost to where you can read more about each character.

REFLECTION CARDS

These cards prompt you to read a Psalm, and to use that Psalm as a doorway to prayer for the day. The focus of these cards is, as the name suggests, more reflective than the other cards.

MARKS OF MISSION CARDS

These cards take one of the Marks of Mission and encourage you to ask questions about your church's way of expressing that Mark. The first is an introduction to the Marks, so don't worry if you haven't come across them before.



HOW IT WORKS

Each day take the next card out of your pack and take some time to reflect on the content. You can do this on your own or in a group.

CA IN LANGLEY

Langley is one of several urban areas which make up the area of Oldbury, an industrial area bordering the Black Country in the west of Birmingham. The area has social issues such as gang culture and people dealing with drug addiction and mental health issues. The Langley Centre of Mission was launched right in the middle of the Covid-19 pandemic and is made up of Val Legg and Simeon Jarvis who are developing solid relationships with the local community by creating youth groups and collaborating with the Living Well Fresh Expression Mission Network and working hard to help local people who are experiencing social issues.

Meet Simeon

live in Langley with my wife and children and although I come from a faith family, I didn't find Jesus for myself until much later in life. I was brought up in the nearby area of Brandhall, but I made the decision to leave the area after a series of poor choices led me to some drug use and mental health problems. At a real low point, I contemplated suicide but found myself asking where that would leave me. Yes, the pain I was going through at that moment would end, but then what? Perhaps influenced by the Gospel seeds sewn in my childhood or the constant prayers of my faithful mother, I turned to God. I asked Him to do something with my life. For the next two weeks I had a very personal encounter with God. It was a life changing experience which was not guided or prompted by anyone else, but by God himself. By the end of it, I realised I hadn't touched drink or drugs and when I left the house I felt as if my eyes had been opened to all life had to offer. I felt guided by God to return to the area I grew up in and the life I led before finding Christ means I can relate more easily to people

because I have experienced first-hand a lot of the

struggles they are facing. Being a local lad with my own fair share of issues, people can open up to me. With the love of Jesus, I have been able to change my life and I am keen to share this and help others do the same.

Langley has two culturally different communities, and the church is in a Muslim community. I have spent time praying to God for a vicar who would be a good fit for the local community, to enable the church to grow and work with us to bridge the divide between the two communities. My prayers have been answered as a wonderful

new vicar is now in post. He is from



Pakistan, speaks Urdu and is trained in evangelistic ministry. We pray together for the local area and hope to collaborate to bring the Gospel to the people of Langley.

Developing relationships with teenagers and young adults in the area is something I am deeply passionate about. On a recent prayer walk, I came across two truanting youths and started a conversation with them. They told me about a local police liaison officer who is making visits to their school to educate them on county lines gangs and offer support. It seemed the police officer had made a positive impact on the youths and so I reached out to him. It turned out that the police liaison officer is also a Christian and has the same passion to help the local youth as I do. This has formed a foundation for both of us to join together to

reach young people.

RETIRED **EVANGELISTS**



Some people may look forward to a retirement filled with leisure time and a slower pace of life but for many of our retired Church Army Evangelists, retirement means they are as busy as ever. Jenny Colby is one such retired evangelist having been commissioned in December 1974, she has been active within the Church Army family for almost 50 years. We spoke to Jenny about her life as a CA Evangelist both before and after retirement and some of the ways she has seen God work throughout her life.

espite being officially retired I am still very much involved in Church Army and it is still deeply rooted in my heart. I had attended a Church Army rally in Northampton in 1969 and felt a real call from God to tell me there was a place for me within Church Army, and was later commissioned in North Kensington, not far from where Wilson Carlile first started the organisation. I have had a varied role within Church Army, starting as deputy warden for the Southampton Hostel where I was responsible for the women's section. Later moving to Cambridge and then Wiltshire where I ran a Christian nurse's school in my capacity of Church Army Officer. Then on to north Wales where I qualified as a primary school teacher and then on to Berkshire. I have now moved back to Wiltshire to be near my family and Grandchildren.

Throughout my work as an Evangelist I have felt God's presence, particularly when I was in Cambridge where I worked within the hostel. Many people had mental health issues and on one occasion someone was using a knife in a threatening manner, but I felt God was protecting me and my young family. I have always had a feeling of God's presence when I have worked in holiday clubs with children, the joy they experience gives me confirmation that God is at work and for me the work was all about sewing the seeds of God's love. Many of the children I worked with have come to faith and God has proven time and time again that perseverance is key. God has always sent the right role, or the right person when I have needed them the most and I have seen this

in other people's lives too.



The most important lesson I have learnt on my evangelism journey is to be patient, not to rush into things. In the Bible, you don't read about Jesus running or rushing people to do things, he is patient and demonstrates to us that we should be patient too. For anyone starting their journey into evangelism my advice to them is to take time to listen to God and be patient. There are times in my life when I have heard

God directly and others when he has been more subtle, but for each it is important to listen and to share what you have heard with others. Take any opportunities He presents to you. It is a journey and God led me to Church Army who I will always consider to be my family.

WORLD DAY OF SOCIAL JUSTICE 2023

Each year on 20 February the United Nations celebrates World Day of Social Justice. The day calls attention to the need to eradicate poverty, hunger and disease as well as promote fairness in education and employment opportunities for everyone. It also looks to tackle issues like human trafficking, child labour and racism.

In a world where over 736 million people still live below the poverty line and close to 1 billion people are unemployed, the day serves as an important reminder of the work that still needs to be done.

As Church Army we want to see those global numbers fall through the work we do in across the UK and Ireland, with people struggling with poverty, hunger, homelessness and unemployment. This week we are focusing our prayers on our efforts to alleviate poverty and how we are helping to fight some of the many injustices that homeless men and women face.

Our Marylebone Project is one of the largest women's only hostels. Through the Sanctuary, Marylebone's 24/7 drop-in centre, we are helping women seeking refuge and support. Last year:



We helped 95 women settle into independent living



495 women visited the Sanctuary drop-in centre





We provided 38,072 nights of accommodation



710 women attended Meaningful Activity sessions

Social justice is about ensuring that everyone in society enjoys the same basic rights and opportunities, regardless of their background or circumstances. It's about building a fairer society where everyone can reach their full potential. That is why services such as the Marylebone Project are helping homeless women in London to find safety, security and support towards a stable future.

Being a young person and homeless in Wales can have a major impact on future prospects and employment opportunities. Statistics show that young people who are homeless are more likely to have poorer health, be unemployed, and have lower levels of education. They are also at greater risk of being involved in crime. Being homeless can therefore have a significant negative impact on a young person's future, making it harder for them to find employment and access opportunities.

Many homeless young people sadly find themselves without a place to call home due to family breakdowns, unsuitable living conditions or leaving the care system. Experiencing a housing crisis is incredibly difficult for anyone but for a young person trying to navigate their way through changing life stages it can be particularly hard. But there is hope. For 20 years now Church Army Ty Bronna has been providing accommodation in Cardiff for 16–21 year-olds who find themselves without a home and to support them every step of the way towards independent living and a hopeful future.

JAYDEN'S* STORY

Jayden's parents were caught up in criminal activity, resulting in Jayden becoming the primary carer for his siblings. The family, as Jayden knew it, was torn apart when the Serious Organised Crime Agency raided the family home and the decision was made by South Wales Police, Children's Services and the Family Courts that he and his siblings were not safe at home and needed to be placed into care. For Jayden, this meant a placement at Ty Bronna whilst his siblings were put into foster care. To protect Jayden and his siblings from further harm, he was only allowed minimal contact with his family. Subsequently, Jayden struggled to maintain his placement at Ty Bronna, presenting challenging behaviour and often returning to the family home. He felt 'the system' and all who worked for it were preventing him for being with his family.

Over time however, Jayden came to realise that by engaging with staff, who were always happy to oblige with anything he needed, he could do things like use the office phone and as a result, staff began to build trusting relationships with him.

Jayden began engaging in support sessions and actively seek out staff for a cuppa and a chat whenever he was at the project, eventually

expressing that it was a relief for him to live in a clean and safe home, where he was no longer living in fear for the safety of himself and his siblings. As a probable result of the trauma he had experienced, Jayden began to experience panic attacks and nightmares, and so night staff at Ty Bronna would offer to sit with him throughout the night and provide him with a caring and safe environment for him to chat through his feelings. Jayden had never been able to build relationships with his peers before due to caring for

his siblings, but in this safe environment he was encouraged and able to do so by participating in activities set up in-house such as DVD nights and games nights.

Encouraged by staff, Jayden engaged with other support services and he entered a construction academy, gaining the skills needed towards a carpentry apprenticeship. He succeeded in his Level 2 and then sought work to become a fully paid carpenter. These huge changes in Jayden's life meant he was seen as a positive influence on his sibling and was granted contact with them once a month with Ty Bronna staff taking him to the contact centre for the visits. Staff referred Jayden to the local council and helped secure accommodation for him in his chosen area of the city, away from his parents. He was the first person in his family to gain employment and become fully independent. Progress was made with his siblings and the visits increased to weekly overnight stays with Jayden taking full responsibility for them in his new home. The Church Army Visiting Support Service helped Jayden to

furnish his property with everything he needed for his siblings.

CA TY BRONNA

Although family mediation was offered, Jayden was very vocal about not wanting to have contact with his parents, who had sadly not made any attempt to change their lifestyle which had caused the breakdown and separation of his family. Jayden left Church Army Visiting Support Services over three months ago but remains in contact and continues to flourish and has been full of gratitude for the staff who have cared for him. He has been invited to engage in Ty Bronna's 'Moving-On Moving-Forward' programme and to return as a mentor so that he is able to share his experience and help other young people overcome barriers they may face to living a happy and independent life.

HAPPY 20TH ANNIVERSARY CA TY BRONNA!

Near the end of last year CA Ty Bronna celebrated their 20th Anniversary! Over the years, the staff at CA Ty Bronna have successfully helped hundreds of young people make positive changes to their lives: providing them with a home, safety and security, plus access to education and jobs. This support has enabled many young people to move on from their previous situations and establish a better future for themselves. To mark the occasion Ty Bronna held an event at the house. The staff invited back past residents to visit for the day to see how much had changed since their time living there and share stories about how their life was changed by this unique place.

Rachel Codd, CA Ty Bronna's Support Service Manager (pictured) said: "20th anniversary was a real moment for us to recognise and celebrate all the amazing work we have achieved. It was a celebration of the collaboration between all the agencies and volunteers who have worked so hard with us all the way along, we couldn't do it without everyone's help. We had a speaker who was a resident in the project 20 years ago. He now works in safeguarding for a homeless charity in



Cardiff and this is a great example of the important work the project does.

It was especially wonderful at the celebration when we opened the time capsules buried at Ty Bronna 20 years ago. There were two capsules, one from Ty Bronna and one from a local primary school, so it was a real community effort when they were put together. We were surprised when we opened them that everything was so well preserved. It included a CD which had been recorded by residents at the time, they had written poems which they had put to music and recorded them on to CD which were sold in the local community to raise money for the project. Incredibly, the speaker we had invited was one of the young people featured on the CD. He hadn't seen it for 20 years so this was really emotional for him.

We have replanted the original time capsules now and added a new one. We asked our current residents to add things and they showed wonderful creativity. They have really thought about what is relevant now and will be interesting to people in the future. They have included things like vapes and COVID tests but probably the most inspirational items are letters that each person has written to their future selves. They have included what their hopes and dreams are for their future lives, it is fantastic to know they are positive about their futures.

Rachel Codd, Support Service Manager at Ty Bronna asks:

A PROJECT IN THE NORTH OF ENGLAND



International Women's Day is on 8 March 2023 and is the perfect opportunity to recognise the women who are working hard for women's rights and making a difference in the lives of women everywhere. Church Army have a project in the north of England who are working hard to support women in need and help them to create a brighter future with hope at the heart of the project.

This Project in the north of England is dedicated to helping vulnerable women who have many different problems such as homelessness, drug addiction or are going through other traumatic challenges. The project provides a drop-in facility and an outreach programme where they aim to reach women who find themselves in the most dangerous of situations. Staff and volunteers at the project give physical and emotional support with love and care for the women they serve with faith and God's love being at the heart of all they do.

Meet Grace*

e have an amazing team of staff and volunteers who have a real heart for the women they serve and do so with love and attention. We work hard to create a safe space for the women in a trauma informed way, being very mindful of the backgrounds and experiences of an individual which can create barriers

for them when trying to access help. We have a broad range of services and these vary depending on the person, it can be anything from making a warm drink and having a chat to attending hospital appointments or accessing housing services. We want to build up trust with the women, many of whom have complex needs and the trust element helps when we try to engage with them. All too often their previous experiences when trying to access

help have been met with judgement and caused trauma which has enforced the distrust of some agencies, we



try to bridge that gap so they feel able to seek the help they need. We believe this is a really powerful way to demonstrate God's love for the women in a practical way and it helps them to see hope for the future. The women we serve face a lot of barriers and life complexities. Homelessness, addiction, poverty and high-risk dangerous situations are commonplace, but they are resilient and we want each of them to know they are loved by God. Faith is at the core of all we do we but the project is accessible to everyone regardless of what they believe. Each day we are grateful for the opportunity to show each woman we encounter God's compassion and love. We get to share God's pursuing and persistent love with them as we join them where they are.

In situations where most people would be surrounded by loved ones, one lady had no-one. She needed a lifesaving operation. Previous bad experiences had left her fearful of the healthcare system. We were able to support her through getting the medical attention she needed by accompanying her to appointments, helping her to prepare for the operation, and hold her hand through a frightening time in her life.

One woman who has been accessing help through the project has been sleeping rough for over nine years. With our help she has just been given the keys to her own flat and for the first time in years she is no longer facing winter on the streets. She has told us that the most wonderful thing about having her own place is being able to choose who is allowed into her home. She has invited all the staff to a floor picnic to celebrate.

CA IN IRELAND

The mission of Church Army is to share the gospel message of hope and transformation throughout the UK and Ireland. Countless lives have changed through God's powerful love and many more continue to be touched by His grace as we impact people in some of the hardest to reach areas. According to the Central Statistics Office of Ireland, over 600,000 people are experiencing deprivation and financial hardship across Ireland, 22.5% of those being children.

In both Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland we are working with dioceses and local churches, using their knowledge and passion to identify areas of need and facilitate change through our Centres of Mission and a growing number of evangelists in churches and projects called to bring God's love to people across Ireland.

This is some of our work in Ireland:

BALLINA

Ballina is situated in County Mayo and the Centre of Mission there was launched in 2016 in partnership with Ballina Churches Together. Marian Edwards is the Evangelist there working to help with social isolation, bringing people together and joining them up with local agencies.

CORK

The Cork Centre of Mission is based in the town of Ballincolig. Launched in 2021 the Centre is relatively new and one of the aims of evangelist Matt Gould is to reach out to the young people in the area through youth cafes and teenage leadership courses. The area is rapidly expanding and so resources are stretched.

KILDARE

Lead Evangelist Philip McKinley is leading the Kildare Centre of Mission. Launched in September 2022 it has a focus to develop the evangelist and pioneering potential of the area and create new worshipping communities around the dioceses of Meath and Kildare.

SLIGO

A staggering 67 different languages are spoken in the town of Sligo which is on the west coast of Ireland. Sligo has seen a large increase in social deprivation in recent years and 28% of the population there live alone. Alan Williamson is the Lead Evangelist at the Sligo Centre of Mission which works in partnership with the Diocese of Kilmore, Elphin and Ardagh.

NEWRY

Newry is positioned on the main road between Dublin and Belfast and is a short drive from the border of the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland. Newry has a long and painful history of conflict and further turmoil has been experienced post Brexit. Scott McDonald and Laurence Bellew are the evangelists working hard in the Newry Centre of Mission proclaiming the good news of the Gospel, peace and reconciliation.

NORTH BELFAST

The North Belfast Centre of Mission was launched in 2015, there our evangelists Karen Webb and Stephen Whitten reach out to local communities including schools and local churches with help and support. They work collaboratively with numerous charity partners including the Diocese of Connor, Christians Against Poverty, Baby Basics and Transforming Lives For Good (TLG).

- Pray the Ballina Centre of Mission will reach people suffering from social isolation.
- Pray the young people of Cork will be open to engaging with the Centre of Mission.
- Pray the Kildare Centre of Mission will forge new connections in the local community, reaching those most in need.
- Pray the Sligo Centre of Mission will reach those suffering with social depravation and loneliness.
- Pray the people of Newry will feel the love and peace of God and feel connected through the Centre of Mission.
- Pray the North Belfast Centre of Mission will make strong relationships with local communities through school ministries and street outreach.

Across England and Wales alone there are 2,000 miles of waterways forming connections between towns. Many people aren't aware there is an entire community that uses these waters for their hobbies, jobs, businesses and for many more people the waterways are their home! WWC is an organisation of trained chaplains from a range of denominations who walk the waterways, offering pastoral care and spiritual support to people whose life and work is centred around these waters. Church Army are delighted to welcome the Waterways Chaplaincy chaplains aboard with their enthusiasm, wisdom and shared vision to see people who live on the margins get the opportunity to know Jesus.


Mark Chester is a Church of England Priest and Senior Waterways Chaplain and has been involved with Waterways for eight years. We caught up with Mark to find out more about this exciting organisation and the brilliant work they carry out on the waterways of Britain.

he canals are used by people from all different walks of life, mainly boaters but also people fishing, cycling and dog walking. Waterways Chaplaincy is about coming alongside those people providing a practical expression of Christ's

and this means helping in a practical way and waiting for

love. The aim is to be pastorally proactive rather than reactive

them to ask why we are there and why we want to help, which normally doesn't take long. This allows us to then talk about Jesus and Gods love. We think of our services as being a three-pronged approach, firstly by offering practical help, if we see someone on a canal bridge and they haven't eaten, we will organise a meal. We would then want to empower that person in whatever ways are appropriate to their situation and this could be a whole range of





support with getting benefit advice. Thirdly, and this is what underpins the ministry, is to offer spiritual support and guidance. When people hit dark times, they often find themselves asking what the meaning of life is and as Christians we have answers which can provide hope. We are in partnership with local churches where we can refer people to when they are searching for spiritual nourishment, but we always try and administer spiritual first-aid with bible passages and prayers.

WWC mainly see people who need our help after falling on hard times and some of these people have taken to the waters to escape society, others are there as they feel they have no choice but whatever the reason there is a whole spectrum of life on the waterways. There is a range of communities, some are grouped by function such a businesses who provide canal boat trips, café boats and there is a network of people who sell fuel and other essentials to the boaters. Often the residential boaters are divorced, middle aged men and they can often find themselves on the outskirts of society and feel isolated and lonely.

A day in the life of waterways chaplain is always different but most would start with a walk of a few miles on the tow path and pray to ask God to provide an encounter with someone in need and that they would have the wisdom to recognise the opportunity to help someone. We do receive a lot of referrals through the website and often through people who have been helped by a chaplain before. This help can be for anything from supporting someone through bereavement, to keeping their boat afloat which is often their home too.

It is wonderful to be part of the Church Army family, a lot of the work we do is in step with the great work Church Army do and we have a similar ethos and mission strategy. I am sure it will be beneficial to all, none more so than the people we continue to serve. PRAYER
