So, as you delve into these stories and firsthand accounts from some of our amazing workers, may they kindle your heart to see change and transformation through hope shared in words and action. All for His glory!





I haven't worked for Church Army for very long, but the main thing that attracted me to this charity is that while striving to serve those most in need in practical ways, Church Army does not shrink back from proclaiming the good news of Jesus. Evangelism is at the heart of who we are.

We live in a time when need is all around us, and increasing daily as the financial crisis deepens. Church Army serves, amongst others, those who are homeless, lonely or impoverished, and it would be easy to feel overwhelmed by these practical needs. But Isaiah wrote this passage to a then future Israel which would be experiencing terrible hardship: exiled under the Babylonian empire, they were kingless, homeless and had lost everything. Yet the feet of those who brought them news that their God had not forgotten them and would soon free them from their captivity, and give them peace, were beautiful.

In my experience feet are not often beautiful things, but the Bible describes the feet of those who bring the good news of Jesus' salvation as 'fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace'. Peace: a quality which in a world of turmoil, is indeed beautiful. Who doesn't want the promise of peace, of goodness, of salvation, a reminder that God reigns and can reign in their life?

Serving the poor in practical ways is a powerful demonstration of God's love, but the greatest gift we can give is the news of Jesus' salvation. Let's pray as we go into Autumn, that all our evangelists and partners, and indeed all of us, are bold in proclaiming the good news to those we meet.

## CROSS HANDS **IMPACT 242**



Cross Hands is a small town near the picturesque Black Mountains in Carmarthenshire, south-west Wales. The area faces inequalities and socio-economic disadvantages, with 33.8% of households in Carmarthenshire living in poverty.\* The area has been identified by the local council as a major 'Growth Zone'. There are plans for future investments in housing, employment and commercial land use, but, while this sounds promising for the future, there is real need in the local community now. Cross Hands Impact 242 is the Centre of Mission where Church Army works in partnership with the Church in Wales Diocese of St Davids to reach third and fourth generation unchurched members of the community. The aim is to have a positive impact on them by showing them God's love in practical and meaningful ways. Esther Lockley is the Lead Evangelist at Cross Hands Impact 242.

Meet Esther

ross Hands has a mixed demographic. Good access to Bristol and Swansea means there are a lot of new build houses, which attract professionals, but there are also people who have lived here their entire lives, along with many generations of their family. There is a real spiritual poverty in the town, with many people, old and young, from all kinds of backgrounds who don't engage with church. There is deprivation here, too. The area is an ex-mining community, so people have been hit hard by changes in the local economy and the current cost of living crisis. We are trying to respond to a whole host of different needs. In the past few weeks, I have had people approach me asking for help because they have a family to feed and only have a pack of sausages to last them until next week. We hand out crisis bags to people who are really struggling and living on the breadline.

> us the chance to be able to connect with them. We are building up trust, and they are starting to understand that we are here to support them. We have been able to pray with some people and invite them to services on Sundays when we eat together. It becomes more than just

about food - it's about filling their spiritual hunger, too.



Being an evangelist in this community is challenging. We have worked hard to host events only to be disappointed with the turnout. Also, a lot of people don't speak English, so it's sometimes been difficult for me to make connections. But we are determined to keep going and trust in God. Engaging with local schools has been especially tough. All of them were reluctant to get involved with us, so I prayed on it, doing prayer walks round the area, and we had a breakthrough with one school agreeing to let us do an assembly. Incredibly, Michelle (Cross Hands Pioneer Evangelist) and I now have relationships with all the local primary schools, where we share the Good News of Jesus in both English and Welsh languages.

We are starting to make a difference, and we are building relationships. But it takes time and it needs to be sustainable. God is at work here and we are getting to know the community and listening to what they need. We want to help people practically and spiritually, see them come to know Jesus and create positive change.

# WHAT IS HAPPENING AT THE MARYLEBONE PROJECT

Homelessness Sunday is on 8 October this year and people are encouraged to raise awareness and campaign against homelessness and the shortage of affordable housing across the UK. At the Marylebone Project in London, it is our mission to provide vulnerable homeless women with a safe haven and a comprehensive range of vital support services. From shelter and pastoral care to education and healthcare, every step is taken in a trauma-informed manner, allowing each woman to feel wanted, safe and valued. The Sanctuary, open 24/7, 365 days a year, is at the heart of our project. Alarmingly, we have witnessed a troubling surge in the number of women seeking refuge. Visits to The Sanctuary soared from 875 in May to a staggering 1,502 in July. Now, more than ever, your support is crucial in helping these women facing crisis and trauma.

#### AWARD WINNERS

We are overjoyed to announce that the Marylebone Project has been awarded the prestigious Homeless Link Award for Excellence in Supported Housing. This award recognises the outstanding and impactful work done in the homelessness sector. Out of 127 entries, the Marylebone Project came out on top, impressing the panel of independent, expert judges with its exceptional person-centred and trauma-informed approaches to support.



The project stood out for its commitment to providing a safe and inclusive space exclusively for women, as well as its high-quality modern accommodation and strong values. This remarkable achievement is testament to the unwavering dedication and hard work of our staff and volunteers.

We are incredibly proud to be recognised as leaders in the field, and we will continue our efforts to make a positive difference in the lives of vulnerable women.

## TRANSFORMED LIVES AT THE MARYLEBONE PROJECT: valentina's fory

Valentina's world was shattered when she found herself estranged from her daughter and escaped from an abusive relationship. Overwhelmed by despair and isolation, she found solace at the Marylebone Project. Thanks to the incredible support and care she received, Valentina's life has undergone a remarkable transformation.

"Everything was so stressful at the time, especially losing my daughter from my care after dealing with the domestic violence case. And I just felt, at the time, that a lot of people were against me. One person who really had my back was Semhar (Sanctuary Centre Team Leader) because she was the only person who believed in me. I was really depressed and I was really down and not myself. Semhar really supported me, which was inspiring, because you don't meet a lot of people who will do so much for you. Semhar really stood up for me in court when I was trying to get my daughter back, Semhar really went out of her way to help me and I got her back! On top of that, I've just graduated this year. By the end of September, I should receive my pin so I can officially be a registered nurse. I believe that Semhar definitely played a really big role in my life, and I'm really thankful. If I had one piece of advice for the women starting their journey here, it's that they are patient enough to work with their key workers. All the women here, they all need support. It is my ambition to be able to come back and work here maybe volunteering in the future, so that I can help other women who are going through what I went through. I want to show them that there is hope, you can change your life around with the help here."

Meet Miriam

I began working at the Marylebone Project in April this year. I am making good progress, but there is still a lot to learn. For the last 10 years, I worked in a church context specialising in homelessness, managing night shelters and projects for homeless people from lots of very complicated and delicate contexts. I am very passionate about helping those most vulnerable and I wanted a position where I could make an impact while retaining a Christian ethos, so the role at the Marylebone Project felt like such a calling for me. It is something that my family and I have prayed over and it is my calling.

I really love the fact that I can use the professional skills I have developed over the years in the homeless sector but also be very intentional with the holistic support we offer to women as a whole person. That is something that the Marylebone Project does so well. We specialise in women's needs in all areas of their lives and that is special. We enable women to feel loved and cared for in a professional capacity, but we also have space for spirituality and allow people to be open in their conversations.

It is a really challenging environment to work in, and, at times, I have felt angry at the trauma a lot of our women are facing. However, anger can be a really healthy emotion that God has given us, and we can use that to propel us forward to fight against these injustices and offer help to actively change lives. I have never come across such an incredible community of people who want to help our women. This makes us stronger, and together, we can do a lot to repair hurt that others have caused.

I love the project and I am passionate about supporting the staff here, who do incredible work. It is the only project I am aware of where women can actually get the full cycle of help. Someone can come to The Sanctuary if they're in crisis or fleeing domestic abuse and they can get everything they need to recover. The project supports women throughout the journey to independent living and beyond. Even when they reach resettlement, we still support them, connecting them with the local community and networks of support. A woman could be here for one night or she could be here up to five years, but we help her through it all and are with her every step of the way."

Along with the day-to-day running of the project, Miriam is involved with managing staff. Providing adequate support in such a challenging environment is key and it is wonderful to know that staff and volunteers feel encouraged by Miriam....

Miriam's kindness and compassion shine brightly in her role as manager. Her genuine care for the wellbeing of her team members creates a supportive and uplifting work environment.



eing involved with Envoy is incredible, and the impact it has had on me is unreal. I am always amazed to see the change in our participants as the Envoy year unfolds and being witness to their enthusiasm as they learn to do evangelism in their own unique way ignites my passion for sharing Jesus with those around me.

The most exciting part of my role in Envoy is coaching the communities. Participants are placed into a small group with a lead coach, who guides everyone through the Envoy year. The groups become communities full of fellowship, support, encouragement and friendship. It is a forum for the participants to share life and their evangelism with one another; their thoughts, feelings, successes and things that perhaps haven't gone so well. Each week, participants are given a podcast to listen to in their own time. They are encouraged to reflect on it and ask God how He wants them to put the teaching into practice in their own contexts. We encourage them to bring their reflections to their Envoy communities to discuss with each other and they really challenge, support and listen to each other and pray for one another. Evangelism is personal,

we are trying to help people hone and own an evangelism that is theirs rather than prescribing something to them. It is our aim to encourage habits and make evangelism natural to each person in whatever way is right for them.

I see so much transformation in people through Envoy.
One lady was incredibly shy when she first joined the group; she wanted to share her faith but didn't know where to start. She was so nervous and didn't talk much in the beginning. Toward the end of the course, she shared with us that she had prayed with someone in a café. That may not sound like much,

but the change for her was monumental. It was really inspiring.

Before Envoy, I would often think about evangelism, but I didn't know how or where to start. Through the Envoy course, I am now able to think of simple ways to evangelise in my daily activities... I am more confident to start conversations about the gospel of Christ... and to ask to pray for others. My Envoy group gave me a sense of belonging.

# CA HEALTHCARE CHAPLAINS

Hospices are an integral part of the healthcare system. These unique sanctuaries bring comfort and solace to individuals suffering from incurable illnesses, supporting them through their journey towards the end of life. With a strong emphasis on dignity, respect and personalised care, hospices are often self-funded and not only attend to the medical needs of patients but extend their holistic support to their loved ones and caregivers as well. Among these compassionate caregivers, many incredible Church Army Evangelists play an essential role as chaplains, providing invaluable spiritual guidance. Commissioned Church Army Evangelist Mike Reeder is an important part of the chaplaincy service at St Luke's Hospice in Sheffield.


Meet Mike

started my working life in catering and hospitality before following my calling and becoming involved with Church Army. I now work as lead chaplain for St Luke's Hospice in Sheffield. I have been there for 16 years now, and I have found that my life experiences, both good and bad, have given me an understanding of life that helps me relate to and support people through pastoral care. I have worked in lots of different roles and parishes all over the country. I have a few catering qualifications and a diploma in evangelism but no degree to speak of, but I don't think that matters. I've graduated from the university of life, and I believe there is more than one way to get to where God needs you to be.

Chaplaincy within a hospice setting is often helping people who are terminally ill as well as their loved ones. People are there for symptom control or pain relief but

also for psychological and spiritual needs. As chaplains, we hope to be able to help each person by building a relationship of trust.

We try to help a person to feel a bit better about things in a non-medicinal way. The hospice movement was created to help people die well, using a trio of medical, psychological and spiritual intervention with each part being as important as the others. Every single human being is spiritual, and some may have faith as part of that, but not everybody. And that's what my role is – to be part of that spirituality.



As chaplains, we have a lot of difficult and delicate conversations with people about what they'd like to happen once they have passed on. Often, we help the bereaved after the death of a loved one, both practically and spiritually. Death is not something we are comfortable talking about as a society, and many people don't know what to do after a loved one has died. Dealing with coroners, undertakers and informing people after the death of a person are all things that need to be done, but because we don't talk about it, not many people know what to do. As well as dealing with their grief, they are faced with practical problems, and we can often help in those situations. Some families also face division and broken relationships, so sometimes our role is to help negotiate family dynamics to allow the wishes of the deceased to be fulfilled.

By getting to know people and providing support in practical matters, it creates a relationship of trust and opens a gateway to talk about spirituality. People will often ask how I cope with these situations, and that allows me to share a little of my faith and my witness. I explain how I lean on my faith. I hope it encourages them to explore a little more and ask themselves what they think.

- Pray for the work of hospices across these islands, that they may bring comfort and peace to those nearing the end of their lives.
- PRAYER Pray for chaplains across the healthcare system, that they will feel supported, loved and encouraged by God in all they do.
- Pray for those supported by chaplains, that they may feel inspired to explore the love of God as they make their final journey of life. That they may find the peace of God, which passes all understanding through the love of Jesus Christ and those who love and walk with them in their lives.

# MISSIONAL YOUTH CHURCH NETWORK



The Missional Youth Church Network (MYCN) is a ground-breaking initiative dedicated to fostering the spiritual development of youth through the establishment of new, vibrant church communities. Founded on the principle of 'by young people, for young people' MYCN is the result of a fruitful partnership between Church Army and the office of the Archbishop of York. By nurturing a sense of belonging and fostering a community spirit, MYCN aims to help local youth leaders and clergy come alongside young people as they explore their faith, discover their potential and make a positive impact on their communities.

In 2019, MYCN set a goal of creating 30 Missional Youth Churches (MYCs) within a span of five years. It is wonderful news that they are well on their way to achieving this target! Currently, MYCN is in touch with over 100 dedicated leaders, from all over the country, who share a passion for building churches with young people right where they are. Out of the 25 MYCs that have been established so far, 16 are already actively fostering a sense of community and delving into the journey of discipleship. The progress being made is inspiring.

I have appreciated being able to 'think aloud' with people who are very experienced in youth work and have benefitted from their wisdom. There is great value in thinking through various options with people who have an understanding of the situation but are not part of it and have no 'agenda' of their own... Being challenged by MYCN to think through what the next steps towards faith might be for the young people and changing our approach so that the youth could take ownership of their night immediately changed the dynamic of the group.







Church Army's collaboration with MYCN is thriving at Centres of Mission in Leeds, Bradford, Greenwich and Wrexham. These inspirational hubs have experienced remarkable growth in their youth communities. MYCN, as innovative leaders in youth ministry, are shaping the future, and their success is set to continue with a vision to create more youth churches across the UK. There is also a new youth team resource, called Explore, which aims to further support youth leaders and clergy in enabling young people to form community and discover faith in Jesus.

MYCN are really excited to be launching Explore – a resource for youth teams. We think it's important to invest in the leadership team and to ensure they share the vision for working among young people in their area, with a view to being able to share faith and grow disciples and to help young people fully participate as co-owners of the project."

## RETIRED EVANGELISTS

For Church Army, Remembrance Sunday holds profound significance. The day encourages us to pause and acknowledge the sacrifices of brave individuals while reflecting on our shared commitment to hope. As a charity rooted in faith and service, we resonate strongly with the values of Remembrance Sunday. We remember the importance of compassion, courage and community while reflecting on Jesus' teachings of peace, forgiveness and the sacredness of life.

This week, we are also getting to know two of our retired Evangelists, Stephen and Eileen Caple. This evangelistic husband and wife team are proof that evangelists never really retire from God's call to share hope with the world.

Embarking on a journey of evangelism can be both exhilarating and challenging. It requires courage, dedication and a willingness to make sacrifices. In the 1970s, two young individuals answered God's call to become evangelists, and their decision profoundly impacted their lives. Eileen and Stephen Caple, retired Church Army Evangelists, share their inspiring story of how Church Army training brought them together and continues to shape their lives and ministries today.

Meet Eileen & Stephen

Eileen and Stephen had different experiences at the beginning of their faith journey. After a visit from Christian Endeavour to her church, Eileen made a total commitment to the Lord and began to feel called to do full-time Christian work. She spoke to her Minister, who came to their family home and told her about Church Army. At that time, the training was only available in London, and since Eileen was the only one working then, she decided it was too difficult and tried to forget about it. However, a year later, the calling became too strong to ignore, so she applied.

Stephen was raised in South Wales and did not attend church as a child, but he joined the Life Boys and then the Boy's Brigade. Aged 17, he made some friends at a Boy's Brigade camping weekend who would later introduce him to the Church of Wales, where his faith grew and blossomed. Stephen's calling from God to explore ministry came to him in very different circumstances. After a severe motorbike accident, he was hospitalised for three months with numerous broken bones and injuries. There, he felt God call him to

ministry, and he applied to Church Army training a year after Eileen did, in 1978. They met at Church Army training in Blackheath.

Before tying the knot, Eileen and Stephen worked on separate projects in London and Bromley. Since then, they have collaborated on ministering in different parishes. Evangelism has been a calling for both of them, albeit in different ways, and some of it has been challenging. Eileen was involved in door-to-door evangelism through her Church Army training, known as Evangelism Explosion at the time. Initially, it was pretty scary, as not everyone wanted to talk to her. However, Church Army training provided the support and encouragement she needed. Stephen and Eileen have used the training they received from Church Army in their various ministries, even showing others how to do door-to-door evangelism and encouraging others in that ministry. They believe it is important not to be pushy and that what they share with people will touch their hearts. They trust God will do the rest. Stephen went on to train for Ordination, and they both witnessed people coming to faith over the years.

Even though they are officially retired, they believe that if you have a heart that wants to share the love of God in some way, no matter how big or small, you should go for it! For Eileen and Stephen, it has been the little things in life that they have done that have often been the biggest encouragement to others.

- Pray that retired Evangelists will be encouraged that God will attend to the seeds they have sown throughout their ministries.
- Pray for retired Evangelists to share their experience and wisdom with others who desire to follow their calling into evangelism.

### CA IN SCOTTISH BORDERS

The Scottish Borders consists of small towns and villages in an area of outstanding scenery, with picturesque coastlines, open countryside, rolling hills and lots of history connected to the textile industry. The production of tartan and tweed is synonymous with the area, but, in recent decades, textile mills in the area have been closing, leading to a loss of community. While the area may be renowned for its natural beauty, living in such a rural environment can create problems, such as isolation, loneliness and limited employment opportunities, plus access to healthcare and associated services can be difficult. To address some of these issues, Church Army, in partnership with the Diocese of Edinburgh, opened the A7 Centre of Mission - named after the main road that connects many of the communities. The ambition is to develop a fresh expression of church that lovingly serves the community in a practical way while spreading the Good News of Jesus. Tim Hatton is the Pioneer Evangelist at the A7 Centre of Mission.

**Meet Tim** 

od is definitely on the move where we are. So many things are starting to happen, and I can feel his presence in all we do. Hawick (pronounced Hoick) is the town we are working from at the moment, and I am the first minister to have lived on the estate for 20 years. A lot of people who live here never leave the estate. Public transport is limited and running a car is expensive, so living here helps me develop relationships with the people in the community.


A young lady who lives not far from us was walking by with her daughter in a pushchair, and she asked if I was the vicar. I said, "Not exactly, but how can I help?" She

explained that she would like to have her daughter christened. We had several talks about it over a few days, and I asked if she had

been baptised. I suggested that maybe God was talking to her, perhaps he was prompting her for them both to

be baptised. It hadn't occurred to her that God may be speaking to her, and, after some thought, she was baptised along with her daughter. I think she is growing in her relationship with Jesus.

We have a community of regular worshippers actively engaged with the Centre of Mission. Two of them are so keen to be involved that they have now become members of the Church Army Mission Community, which is wonderful.



We had a recent donation from Asda of £15,000 worth of school uniforms, which they very kindly gave us to distribute to families in the local towns. It has strengthened our relationships with schools and families, which has been a wonderful blessing and will hopefully allow us to collaborate with them in the future.

There is so much for us to do in our community and so much need. It is our vision to open a church in the centre of town. We are in the process of securing premises, which will bring an injection of life to an otherwise unloved high street. 'Wilf's Place' will be a fresh expression of church and a vibrant hub right in the heart of the community, where we will offer a whole manner of much-needed services. We want to help people feel God's love on a practical and spiritual level.

The Greenwich Centre of Mission will be spreading the Good News of Jesus through practical love and support for the community throughout Advent, with several Christmas parties for local children and their care givers. The parties will be joy filled with heartwarming Christmas music and the timeless Christmas story as well as Christmas gifts for the children. Evangelists Karen and Nick will be making 30 – 40 food hampers, which will be distributed to needy families on two housing estates in the area.

In the Cross Hands community, there are some families who may be facing financial hardships during the festive season. That's why evangelists Esther and Michelle at the Cross Hands Impact 242 Centre of Mission have a heart-warming initiative called the Tree of Hope. Thanks to the generosity of the community, last year we were able to bring joy to 30 children who might have otherwise gone without a present. ## **OUR EVANGELISTS**



Have you ever wondered what motivates an evangelist? What drives them to share the message of Jesus with others? Their reasons may differ, but one thing is consistent – they all have a story. For James Hawksworth, that story is one of personal transformation. He was a former drug user whose encounter with Jesus transformed his life and set him on a path to seeing that transformation happen in the lives of others. Now an Evangelist with the Suffolk Centre of Mission, James' story is a powerful testimony to the transformative power of the gospel and how God can take the most broken pieces of our lives and use them for His glory.

Meet James

rowing up, I lived with my mum. I saw my dad regularly, and he would take us to church. He had become a Christian after seeing Billy Graham in 1986, but my mum wasn't religious. In my early teens, I thought church was boring, irrelevant and was just an obstacle in the way of me sneaking off for a cigarette. As I got older, I started to experiment with drugs and became depressed and aggressive, resulting in me yo-yoing from living with my mum to living with my dad. I had fallen out with my older brother after I had acted badly towards him and eventually my behaviour became too much for either of my parents to manage, so I left home. I was living in a flat, by myself, and I was starting to think that things had to change. My older brother came to visit me, and I thought it was going to be difficult because of what I had done to him, but instead of being angry, he forgave me. It was as he left and I closed the door that I suddenly felt God's presence fill the room. I felt an overwhelming sense of peace, excitement and hopefulness all at the same time. I remember punching the air and saying to myself, "This is it now – I want to live for you, God!"

I started reading the Bible, and, when I got to Acts, reading about mission journeys. I thought, "This is what I want to do." It was a really exciting time. Later, I met my wife and started looking for ways to be involved in ministry, to build community and to find restoration and reconciliation. I began searching the internet for church planting and evangelism training and discovered Church Army. I applied and started the training towards being a Commissioned Evangelist.

But it wasn't all plain sailing; things became quite challenging and difficult



for me. After commissioning, I began my first post with CA, but, for a lot of different reasons, I decided to leave, I felt a lot of self-doubt and embarrassment, and I let that get the better of me. I started a job as a support worker, to rebuild my confidence, and it was there that I began to talk to people about faith, offering pastoral support. One of the people I was supporting came to faith because of our chats, and I knew that evangelism was my true calling. I contacted Church Army and had a meeting to unpack what had happened in my previous role. They encouraged me to start again and to apply

for a position in Bradford. This was the start of my new beginning; I found my passion again and was successful in applying for the role.

I have worked for Church Army since, and I am now the Pioneer Evangelist at the Suffolk Centre of Mission. Looking back at my first post with CA, I realise that I was quite broken, burnt out and disappointed. But after taking time and speaking to people, I knew that I still had gifts and abilities and that God could use me in meaningful ways. With the help of CA, I took things back to basics and started again. I believe I am God's child. and I will function wherever he takes me.

#### DAN ORTIZ


#### Researcher

# WATERWAYS CHAPLAINCY

Living on the waterways may seem like a dream, but, for many, it's a challenging reality. Accessing healthcare, finding a supportive community and nurturing spiritual connections can feel like an impossible task. That's where the Waterways Chaplaincy steps in.

The Waterways Chaplaincy is dedicated to helping those who call the waterways their home, providing practical, pastoral and spiritual support. And with the growing number of volunteers, this vital ministry is making a difference. However, with 2,000 miles of waterways in England and Wales, there's still much more to be done.

Here we introduce Chris Upton, the new National Lead for Waterways Chaplains. With over 20 years of experience in ministry, Chris is eager to roll up his sleeves and make an impact.

Meet Chris

Before joining the Waterways Chaplaincy, I worked as a Baptist minister in Haworth, West Yorkshire – home of the Brontes – and we have been here since 2000. I loved the role and being able to dig deep into the local community, but I decided that maybe it was time to stretch my wings a little. I first came across Waterways Chaplains at Greenbelt festival. I got my name on the mailing list and began receiving emails. When I saw the Waterways position, there were a couple of things that really stood

out to me. Boats and sailing have always been a passion of mine

- my first degree was in Naval Architecture, so anything to do with boats is a real draw. I have also developed a growing recognition that I work better outside of the church, where I can take the church to people, and so the chaplaincy bit really caught my eye. I am looking forward to the challenge and developing a good in-depth knowledge of local chaplains and experiencing being a Waterways Chaplain.

I'm a big believer in the local congregation discerning how best to respond to the local context, and I think that's in keeping with Church Army's focus on projects and





each one being distinct and individual. Waterways Chaplaincy is growing, but there is still room for further growth for it to meet the need. There are 2,000 miles of tow paths, and we don't yet have enough chaplains to cover them all. I would like to see Waterways Chaplaincy be visible to those who need us and those in the church. I also want to encourage the church to understand Waterways Chaplaincy so that we can work in sync with local churches to provide better care and cover for people in tow-path communities up and down the country that have been forgotten. Six million people a year use these waterways, and they're a great place for spiritual refreshment, time out and everything else that people use the canals and tow paths for.

As part of Church Army, Waterways Chaplaincy needs to be willing to go in humility and be Christ's hands and feet, meeting the needs of people where they are. Chaplaincy on the waterways is a great format for that.

- Pray for more people to be inspired to become a volunteer with The Waterways Chaplaincy, particularly in the north of England where there is a real shortage of volunteers.
- Pray for the people using the waterways to feel encouraged and supported by the Waterways Chaplains.
- Pray for the Waterways Chaplains to make connections with people using the waterways and that this would lead to a solid foundation for people to come to know Jesus.
- Pray for Waterways Chaplaincy to become a visible presence within communities and local churches to create and strengthen relationships
